WELCOME

Volunteers and staff members at St. Vincent de Paul, Roseville, were diligently and steadily working during this fall; one of our busiest seasons. The season began with our very successful Virtual Event in October of 2021, then quickly transitioned into our annual Thanksgiving Turkey Distribution Program and Christmas Gift Program. It is our hope to distribute a quarterly newsletter highlighting our wonderful programs and offering you, our valued supporters, insight into the good works happening in our community. MEET THE HAW FAMILY

An extended family, the Haws are the largest client household of St. Vincent de Paul's Food Locker. The four generations include four seniors (great grandmother and great grandfather as well as grandmother and grandfather), two adults (daughter and her husband), and four children (3 kids and a baby with another baby on the way.)

The Haw family, originally from the Philippines, spent many years in the Bay area, moved to the Sacramento region in 1991 and ended up in Roseville 18 years ago. They love their hometown and especially appreciate the services they can access for their 37-year-old daughter who has Down's syndrome.

Once a week he arrives at 8:15 am, 45 minutes before the Food Locker even opens, just to be sure there will be plenty of food available for his large family. He says the quality of the food is always "very good; from top markets like Trader Joe's and Nugget."

Mr. Haw describes the people he's met at St. Vincent de Paul as "very nice and always courteous." He is grateful for the special things that they do for his family members.

St. Vincent regularly provides diapers for his grandbaby and protein drinks for his elderly father. On Thanksgiving, they received enough groceries for a huge turkey dinner and at Christmas time, lots of toys for the children and gift cards for the adults.

Mr. Haw (the grandfather) first learned about the St. Vincent de Paul Food Locker by word of mouth from members of his community. Interestingly, he had already been volunteering to collect food for different food lockers in Sacramento County. After moving to Roseville, Mr. Haw began volunteering to pick up food in his pickup truck from Denio's Farmer's Market.



Like many families in Placer County, the Haw family was struck by Covid just after Christmas. By the grace of God, the four oldest members of the family were not exposed and remain well, while several younger members became sick and remain in guarantine. Mr. Haw is thankful that his family was able to celebrate Christmas Eve together, but sad that they missed having their New Years festivities.

Rebecca Rush, the Executive Director of St. Vincent de Paul. Roseville, said of Mr. Haw. "He's a humble man and does not ask for what he does not need for his family." Mr. Haw speaks for his entire family when he says, "We are very grateful to have St. Vincent de Paul in our lives." May the Haw family be blessed with good health and happiness in 2022!

WORDS OF WISDOM AND Encouragement



A reminder to us that this life here on earth is filled with peaks and valleys. My Grandparents lived through the last great pandemic, the Spanish flu, two World Wars and the Great Depression as did many whom we call "The Greatest Generation". How did they persevere and prevail? They had hope, they had tenacity, they had an inner strength. They understood that sometimes we walk through the valleys to reach the peaks. And they pass that knowledge on to us by how they lived their lives. Those who were hurting less, reached out to those who were hurting more; and in that, all found strength and healing. 
A special thanks to the National Charity Leagues of South Placer County and Granite Bay and Boys Team Charity for providing most of our volunteers.

It started with one law firm feeding 12,000 people and has now grown to feeding nearly 500,000 individuals.

With the matching funds from Lawyers vs Hunger, the campaign raised a total of \$49,023 for programs offered at St. Vincent de Paul, Roseville.
