#### Meet Rebecca Rush

Rebecca Rush has been the Executive Director of St. Vincent de Paul, Roseville since 2018. I recently sat down with her to find out more about her background, focusing on the path that led her to St. Vincent's doors. Rebecca also shared some of her insights and experiences of the last four years.

For Rebecca, a life of service began early. Raised in a military family, her parents adopted several children in need of a family. During Rebecca's teen years, they fostered many children of diverse backgrounds. Helping people was a strong theme of her upbringing.

Rebecca wasn't the only one to hear the call to service. Two of her biological sisters chose similar careers; one became a nurse and the other a teacher. Rebecca, a self-described introvert, preferred to work behind the scenes. While the extroverts like to get out front giving speeches and shaking hands, Rebecca prefers sitting behind her desk, meeting with clients and writing grants.

Before she even had a chance to finish college, Rebecca was hired to work for the Sheriff's Youth Programs of Minnesota (SYPMN) as their Information/Technology Director, a job she held for four years. Then she was promoted to Vice President of Operations during which time she was tapped for Interim Chief Executive Officer. Rebecca was promoted to CEO with the promise that she would finish her college degree which she did - a bachelor's degree in Behavioral Health.

After 11 years with SYPMN, the agency was acquired by a larger non-profit organization. Rebecca takes pride in the outcome of the negotiations; 98% of the rank-and-file employees were able to stay on the job. Understandably (maybe), the entire upper-level staff was let go...including Rebecca.

With every disappointment comes a new opportunity. Rebecca took advantage of her new (jobless) status to move to California. Not only had she enjoyed living here as a child, but her oldest daughter, an Air Force veteran, was living in Folsom with her husband and 3 children. Win-win!

Rebecca's first job in California was as a compliance officer for an agency called LifeSteps U.S.A. In that position, she oversaw reporting for social services provided to residents living in low-income apartment complexes.

In 2013, Rebecca was recruited to the position of Executive Director of HeartLand Child & Family Services in Del Paso Heights. It is an outpatient program that provides mental health services to approximately 400 young MediCal recipients a month in North Sacramento. When she moved on, Rebecca was asked to become a member of HeartLand's Board of Directors. Rebecca moved to her current position as Executive Director of St Vincent de Paul. Roseville in 2018.

As the top administrator, Rebecca came with three main goals, advocating for employees, developing a positive culture, and effecting real change. She has certainly made a difference in all three areas.

Don Fraser, the president of St. Vincent's board, elaborated on Rebecca's many accomplishments. First, she has taken over grant research, writing, and compliance. Second, she single-handedly manages the Rental Assistance Program for St. Vincent. This involves reviewing applications, conducting intake interviews, and evaluating levels of need. Most importantly, Rebecca reconstructed operations during the pandemic to continue critical services while ensuring the safety of clients, employees, and volunteers. Don said, "We never had anyone contract Covid at St. Vincent".

When asked what she likes most about working at St. Vincent de Paul, Roseville, Rebecca answered, "There's so much. I love that everybody is just so giving of their time. This is an agency where everybody...genuinely wants to help people and care about the good of the community." She added one more bonus, "I get paid to do it!"

Rebecca said that at every board meeting the chairperson asks, "Who has a good work story to share?" Then everyone turns and looks at her. Rebecca's story is always the same. It starts like this, someone comes to Rebecca saying. "Oh shoot, we're almost out of baby formula" (or diapers or peanut butter or ???). Inevitably, in one or two days, a large shipment of that item appears at the warehouse. It's just hard to believe that God isn't involved.

Rebecca calls St. Vincent de Paul, Roseville her "forever home". She's just so comfortable here. How many people can say that their job strengthens their faith and brings them peace? Welcome home, Rebecca.

The most powerful person to ever walk this earth never used his power, his dominion for himself. He cured the sick, gave sight to the blind, fed thousands and raised people from the dead. Even while facing death on the cross, he gave completely of himself. Quite simply, it's called servant leadership. During the Last Supper, he endured Judas' betrayal; foretold Peter's denial; heard an argument over who was greatest and instructed his disciples how to lead. He modeled servant leadership; and gave his disciples commandment, "love one another as I have you". Jesus exemplified servant loved leadership in the washing of feet, telling his disciples, "I did this ... so you will do it too," Instead of seeking power, Jesus sought to empower others to experience the freedom and joy of servant leadership and sacrificial love. The reign of God he preached was about creating a community of mercy, a community of charity, a community of love.



With the new fiscal year comes opportunity for new program funding for the services provided by St Vincent de Paul Roseville. We have various grant proposals pending approval later this month and will update on those in our Fall Newsletter.
