MESSAGE FROM OUR PRESIDENT

I am pleased to present our Annual Report for the 2023-24 fiscal year.

As you will see later in this report, our Food Locker saw over a 40 percent increase in usage during 2023-24. For 2024-25 (through December), our numbers continued to climb, with a 33% increase from 2023-24. Based on a conservative estimate, we are likely to serve close to 20,000 households this year. The result is that our Food Locker is bursting at the seams.

Given this, we have begun a planning effort to remodel the warehouse to keep up with the needs in our community. With more people comes the need for more food and for more storage. We are in need of more cold storage and are looking at adding a new and larger walk-in refrigeration unit. This will require us to do some reconstruction of the warehouse to fit the additional unit. We are also creating a plan to improve the flow of goods coming into and out of the food locker.

Fortunately, we have been able to keep up with the demand for food. This is largely due to our participation in Feeding America and the large number of grocery stores that contribute to us. Every day, our volunteer drivers go out to our local grocery stores and pick up food that is used to feed our clients.

Many thanks to our donors, churches, volunteers, and other community partners that allow us to continue to provide our services. With a budget of approximately \$800,000 in 2023-24, we were able to leverage an additional three and a half times that amount in goods and services. On behalf of our Board, staff, and clients, I want to express a big thank you to all who contribute and help us achieve our mission of preventing hunger and homelessness.

MISSION

Our mission at St. Vincent de Paul Roseville is to provide basic human services and programs to prevent hunger and homelessness.

VISION

We are a leader in providing social services for South Placer County. We are dedicated to assisting families and individuals in need, directly or in collaboration with others, thereby enabling them to improve the quality of their lives and helping achieve self-sufficiency. Guided by faith, our volunteers and staff respond in a spirit of love and compassion.

St. Vincent de Paul Roseville is a non-profit organization funded entirely through private donations, grants, churches, local businesses, and corporate donations. Without the ongoing support of our community and volunteers, we would not be able to continue in our charitable mission.

The Roseville conference was founded in 1983, and has become one of the largest privately funded providers of human services in South Placer county.

We provide HOPE and HELP for people in need, including people experiencing homelessness and families struggling financially and at risk of becoming homeless. Our goal is to provide short term assistance on the road to self-sufficiency for some. For others, it will be a vital service to help them maintain an adequate standard of living.



The Food Locker is open 3 mornings each week, Monday, Wednesday & Friday. The food distributed benefits the health and well-being of clients, and contributes to their ability to use their dollars elsewhere in the household budget by providing much needed groceries. Clients may obtain supplemental groceries from us weekly. Each client receives a full, standard sized grocery cart consisting of fresh produce, dairy, meat, eggs, breads, pasta, rice, beans, canned goods, and a variety of USDA staples. Each cart contains enough groceries to prepare at least nine (9) meals for each family member. Baby food, diapers, and feminine hygiene products are also available.

The chart below shows the increase in household attendance over the past few years.





The St. Vincent de Paul Roseville Dining Room provides nutritious and balanced meals five days each week to anyone who is hungry. Our Dining Room is open Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday from 12:00 to 1:30 pm, and on Saturday and Sunday from 2:30 until 4:00 pm.


Volunteers prepare and serve the meals. At the end of 2023, we returned to indoor dining.

The Home Delivery Programs, known as BAGS (Bags Abound in Groceries and Staples) provides nutritious supplemental groceries to homebound seniors and disabled adults in the cities of Roseville and Rocklin. The program focuses on low salt, low sugar, and shelf stable items such as cereal, pasta, fresh fruits and vegetables, milk, cheese, eggs, and yogurt. Volunteer teams deliver to 75 homebound households in Roseville and 54 in Rocklin. The program is funded through generous grants awarded from the cities of Roseville and Rocklin. The program has the capacity to serve up to 85 households in both Roseville and Rocklin.






In 2017, St. Vincent de Paul Roseville implemented a rental and utility assistance program. Since that time, rental assistance has been expanded to support residents throughout Placer County with grant awards from a variety of sources.

This is another element in our effort to prevent homelessness by actively assisting families in maintaining housing stability. In 2023-2024, we assisted 75 households with rental assistance and 44 households with utility assistance. As can be seen from the graphic below, the amount we have expended over the past years has increased rapidly. We continue to seek out grants enabling us to help as many as possible.

Rent and Utility Funding





St. Vincent de Paul Roseville experienced an increase in the number of senior households facing emergencies in housing stability. When a senior household on fixed income is unable to pay rent, possibly met with an emergency expense they are unable to cover, and nowhere to turn for help, the fear of eviction can be a real and devastating possibility.

In the Spring of 2024- SENIORS IN CRISIS - was launched with funds raised through
Big Day of Giving. The program has assisted 9 senior households since its inception.







In addition to our food and home assistance programs, we also provide the following programs to assist families with children:

The Backpack Program serves up to 200 children annually






The Christmas Holiday Shop provides gifts to up to 250 children each year. Staff and volunteers stock the shop and assist the shoppers. Gifts are donated through the community partners and our church partners.







Each year St. Vincent de Paul Roseville undertakes a survey of our Food Locker clients. For the calendar year 2025, a two-fold survey was conducted which included our Food Locker survey, and the Homelessness Prevention survey.




With the additional food you receive each month at the St. Vincent de Paul Food Locker; do you and/or other family members have to skip meals?




Food Locker helps to reduce food insecurity. The annual survey confirms that we are successful in meeting our mission to prevent hunger and homelessness.


